Douglas Park Civic Association Cases 01/01 – 09/11, 2021 v. 2022

Below is an overview of cases in the Douglas Park Civic Association for 01/01 - 09/11, 2021 v. 2022.

Statistics were compiled using the "Occurred Incident Type" field for offenses and the "Reported Date" field for date. Cases that were unfounded were excluded. Only cases with associated geospatial information are included.

Please note the data below are based on information available as of the query date. Data are subject to change upon further investigation. Some crimes/incidents may be reclassified at a later date.

- There have been 363 cases reported in Douglas Park in 2022 YTD.
- 152 cases (41.9%) in 2022 YTD have been cleared (arrest, exceptional, non-criminal).
 - o 24.0% of cases have been cleared by arrest.

LARCENY FROM AUTO PREVENTION TIPS

Larcenies occurring from automobiles are crimes of opportunity. Take a proactive step against theft by following our DOS and DONTs when leaving your vehicle unattended.

DO REMOVE THE OPPORTUNITY FOR

- Park in well-lit and high-traffic areas
- Keep doors locked and windows up
- Move valuables to vour trunk





DON'T

- Leave your car running unattended at any
- Leave electronic cords or GPS visible
- Leave items under your seat

DON'T

- Leave bags (gym, shopping, etc.) visible
- Leave electronics (cell phones, iPads, etc.) in your vehicle
- Leave a spare key in vour vehicle

Motor vehicle thefts are often crimes of opportunity. In many cases, thieves take advantage of unsecured doors and windows of vehicles with keys left inside. The public can reduce the opportunity for crime with these prevention tips:







- Be aware of your surroundings when entering and exiting your vehicle.
- Limit your use of devices that may distract you, such as cell phones and headphones.
- Park in well-lit, high traffic areas and activate exterior lights at your home.
- Do not leave your keys, fobs, or valet keys in your vehicle. This includes keys to a secondary vehicle.
- Close and lock all windows and doors when you park. Double click the lock button on the key fob to receive a confirmation beep/chirp or pull on the door handle to verify
- Never leave the area while your vehicle is running, even for a short period of time. Doing so is illegal in the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- Ensure that your vehicle is turned OFF when leaving it unattended. Vehicles with keyless ignition systems can be driven for extended periods of time, even if the key fob is not inside of the car. Be sure to read your owner's manual carefully and familiarize yourself with your vehicle's keyless ignition system.
